Why Update User Fees

- Subsidies in services impact the General Fund
 - Private & specific benefit services are subsidized by unobligated funding sources
 - Reduces ability to fund general & community benefits
- Decreased department funding typically results in understaffing and reduces service quality
- Cost recovery knowledge and planning
 - Provides clarity of pressures on City resources
 - Enables City to strategize and set fees to benefit of the City and community
 - State requirements for reasonable cost-based fees



User Fee Objectives & Steps

- Determine full cost of providing services or programs
 - Review fee schedules based on service delivery
 - Identify potential new fees (not currently collected)
 - Reduce or remove fees
 - Using fully-burdened rates, calculate full cost recovery
- Update fees for service based on cost analysis
 - Incorporate or establish cost recovery goals
 - Subsidies allow access to services and facilitate compliance
 - Identify appropriate fee levels that:
 - ✓ Enhance reasonability and applicability
 - Maintain consistency with local policies and objectives
 - Maintain legal compliance with state law



Scope of the Study

- Review and calculate cost of providing services and related fees charged by the following departments and divisions:
 - Administration
 - Finance Business License
 - Parking Enforcement
 - Parks and Recreation
 - Planning
 - Building & Safety
 - Golf Fees included without analysis or change
 - Public Works



Data & City Staff Participation

- Primary types of data used:
 - Expenditure data
 - Staffing structures
 - Central service/Indirect overhead
 - Productive/billable hours
 - Time estimates to complete tasks
 - City/Department input, feedback and policies
- Staff support throughout process essential to ensure analysis fidelity



Summary Steps of the Study





Administrative

- Time based cost analysis on user fees in schedule
- Analysis found that current fees were not in line with the full cost of services
- Suggested fee notes:
 - An increase for 19 fees
 - 1 fee would decrease
 - 1 new fee, Records Request Special Request, would be added
 - 73 fees would remain as currently set, most related to Animal Control and Waste Management services



Finance - Business License

- Business Licenses are considered a tax and were not analyzed as part of the study
- Two related business license services are user fees and were analyzed
 - Analysis found that the two fees are subsidized
- Suggested fee notes:
 - An increase to the New Business Listing and Duplicate License fees from \$2 to \$5 each
 - Increase to the Credit Card Convenience Fee from 2.36% to 4% based on a program cost analysis
 - Remaining taxes would remain as currently set

Parking Enforcement

- Mixture of penalties and user fees
- Time based cost analysis for user fees
- Analysis found that current fees are currently subsidizing the cost of service
- Suggested fee notes:
 - An increase to 47 fees
 - 4 new fees would be added
 - 19 fees would remain as currently set



Parks and Recreation

- Rental fees are use of government property and should be set based on market, policy, & usage factors
- Time based cost analysis for program fees
- Suggested fee notes:
 - An increase to 162 fees, with most services to maintain large subsidies
 - 14 fees would remain as currently set
 - Overall, the average fee change would be approximately a 37% increase



Planning

- Time based cost analysis
- Analysis found that Planning services are currently being provided well below their cost
- Suggested fee notes:
 - An increase to 39 fees
 - 5 new fees would be added
 - 6 fees would change to actual cost from a flat or deposit fee
 - 1 fee would change to flat fee from actual cost to flat
 - 2 fees would decrease
 - 10 fees would remain as currently set



Building & Safety

- City utilizes the Los Angeles County fee schedule
 - Analysis was based on a program cost analysis
- Cost recovery is 59% with indirect support included
 - City is currently only recovering direct cost
- Suggested fee notes:
 - Recommendation is to increase fees by 20% to be at a 71% cost recovery
 - 1 new fee would be added



Public Works

- Time based cost analysis
- Analysis found that current fee levels are subsidizing the cost for most services
- Suggested fee notes:
 - An increase for to 26 fees
 - 17 new fees would be added
 - 3 fees would change from flat to actual cost
 - 59 fees would remain as currently set



Policy Considerations

- General standard: individuals or groups who receive private benefit from service should pay 100% of cost
- In certain situations, subsidization is an effective public policy tool:
 - Encourage participation
 - Ensure compliance when cost is prohibitive to residents
 - Promote access to services
- Recommend that City utilize inflation factor to annually adjust fees based on CPI, MOU, or another factor
- Comprehensive analysis every 5 years
